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THE ORPHAN TRAIN MOVEMENT:

1854-1929

**SPEAKER:
DONNA AVILES**

SUMMARY:

Learn the history of this seventy-five year “social experiment”—now recognized as our country’s first Foster Care System—which transported an estimated 250,000 homeless children from the streets of East Coast cities to farming communities of the Midwest in search of stable homes. This presentation includes the first person account of orphan train rider Oliver Nordmark who, in 1906, traveled with his younger brother from the Children’s Village on Long Island to the small town of Bern, Kansas. Attendees will hear audio recordings of Oliver telling just what it was like to ride the orphan train and then be chosen by a childless farmer and his wife. Additional recordings include “life in the orphanage” and “living in a sod house on the Kansas prairie.” The presentation concludes with a discussion of the importance of journaling one’s own story, through oral history or personal narrative, as a means of preserving social history. Q&A is encouraged throughout the presentation as well as at the end.

ABOUT THE SPEAKER:

Donna Aviles, a resident of Pike Creek, Delaware, is the award-winning author of two books, *Orphan Train To Kansas* and *Peanut Butter For Cupcakes – A True Story From The Great Depression*. Both books are narrative non-fiction, taking place during important periods of American history. As a descendant of an orphan train rider, as well as a member of the National Orphan Train Historical Society of America, Ms. Aviles has extensive knowledge of the Orphan Train Era and is passionate about sharing her expertise with audiences of all ages.

Have you ever wondered what happened in Delaware during the Revolutionary War? How did the British get from the Head of the Elk River to Chadds Ford for the Battle of the Brandywine? Kim Burdick is a specialist in Delaware History and folk culture, and audiences of all ages will be amazed to hear letters and writings by colonial Delawareans describing the arrival of the British army and the social upheaval it brought to our colony.

ABOUT THE SPEAKER:

Kim Burdick is an award-winning public historian who has coordinated a number of major projects including the nine-state and DC Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route (2003-2009), and a variety of local seminars and symposiums including “18th Century Abolitionists”, co-sponsored by Quaker Hill Preservation Foundation (Spring 2013), “George Washington: Man and Myth” (June 2014) and “Voices of the Past: Stories of the Black Patriots of the American Revolution” (Spring 2017).

Latin American history, anthropology, geography, language and music disciplines will be blended to present the diversity among the many countries that make up Latin America and their historic presence in the current USA. The presentation combines images of people and places, as well as music and ways of expression through dance. Teachers and audiences can identify specific themes for the presenter to focus on and students will be invited to participate.

Charito Calvachi-Mateyko has spent her professional career studying, mastering and implementing established methods to promote peace and justice within society. She is a restorative justice practitioner and a passionate promoter of racial justice and the Latino culture. She has had rich and diverse experiences such as being a lawyer, a radio show host, an author, a storyteller and a teacher. Using her passion for her work and her ability to forge strong interpersonal connections, Charito has helped heal the wounds of crime, build communities and broaden cultural awareness.

What paradigm can we use to reflect in the human experience of what humanity understand as justice? Is our justice language charged with preconceptions? What ancient principles we carry on in the modern concept of justice in general and criminal justice in particular? A former lawyer turned Restorative Justice professional will discuss the theory of restorative justice as an alternative to the current social construct on justice issues. Ms. Calvachi-Mateyko, gives a brief overview of the challenges presented by the current punitive system and invites the participants to consider a community healing path to handle justice today.

SUMMARY:

The History of Etiquette begins with the Middle Ages, and Erasmus's teaching of classroom etiquette to young men in the Catholic Church classrooms, then progresses to King Louis the XIV's use of the word etiquette, and how the social and etiquette expectations of polite society followed the early settlers of the United States. Audiences will learn how the demonstration of what is known as good manners were a part of survival techniques in the formation of our country! The program will also cover pandemic etiquette (from the Spanish Flu in 1918), to the more recent COVID-19 etiquette, and how that has changed human interaction. The program is very interactive, the audience gets to participate, there are props, and there can be costume changes!

ABOUT THE SPEAKER:

Lisa Strong Chase, M.B.A, M.Div. is an educator, fundraising professional and a Presbyterian Minister, with the Presbyterian Church -USA. For many years, Lisa directed and taught a leadership development program that focused on manners, etiquette, team building, leadership, and social dance for children and youth through the National League of Junior Cotillions, where she was an award-winning director for her chapter direction, community service, and teaching abilities. It was this program that led her to develop a program called The History of Etiquette: Why We Do What We Do.



THE RIGHT TO LIE

SUMMARY:

In 2016, a federal appeals court struck down an Ohio law that provided penalties for lying during political campaigns. The reason? There is, in fact, a constitutional right to lie. Sure, you can be prosecuted for things like fraud, perjury, and libel, but those are exceptions. In general, constitutional protection for free speech does not depend on whether the speech is true. And when the topic is politics, untruthful speech is not only protected under the First Amendment, but enjoys the highest level of constitutional protection. Why? For twenty minutes or so, we'll step back from the fray of partisan politics to take a look at the history and ideas behind our current system. Have we reached a point in the history of our country where political lying has so disrupted our electoral system that the public good requires the establishment of legal limits comparable to those placed on perjury? If so, what should such a policy look like, and what unintended consequences might follow?

ABOUT THE SPEAKER:

Joan Delfattore holds a Ph.D. in English and an M.S. in clinical psychology from Penn State University. She's professor emerita of English and legal studies at the University of Delaware, where she taught for more than thirty years. FAKE NEWS, FRAUD, AND HONEST ERROR: THE PSYCHOLOGY OF BELIEF

How do we decide what we believe, and what we don't believe? Drawing on philosophical, psychological, and legal resources – and avoiding partisan politics – this talk outlines a few of the unconscious factors that influence the way humans reach conclusions and make decisions.

She's professor emerita of English and legal studies at the University of Delaware, where she taught for more than thirty years. ESCAPE FROM HITLER'S EUROPE THE COMET LINE AND ITS HELPERS

SUMMARY:

In 1941, an increasing number of Allied aircraft were being shot down in Nazi-occupied Europe. Although most downed airmen were killed or taken prisoner, some evaded capture and were sheltered by Allied sympathizers and the emerging resistance movement to German rule. The road of safety—and to fight again—for these airmen was a treacherous journey by train, by bicycle, and on foot that stretched hundreds of miles from Belgium, across occupied France, to the Pyrenees Mountains at the Spanish border. My presentation will focus primarily on the brave and selfless resistance women, especially the 24-year-old Belgian Andree de Jongh and the American Virginia d'Albert-Lake, who organized and conducted these journeys on this underground railroad, known as the Comet Line, who helped to save nearly 800 airmen.

ABOUT THE SPEAKER:

Linda De Roche is Professor of English and American Studies at Wesley College in Dover, DE, where she teaches courses in American literature and culture and gender studies. A former Fulbright Scholar who conducted research on the American Civil War in England, she holds the doctorate from the University of Notre Dame and has published scholarly works on classic and contemporary writers including F. Scott Fitzgerald, Willa Cather, Edith Wharton, and Mary Higgins Clark. She is currently at work on a study of Jazz Age literary works and a biography of Mrs. Victor Bruce, a contemporary of Amelia Earhart, who in the 1920s and 1930s held land, air, and sea speed and endurance records and once flew solo around the world. THE RITCHIE BOYS

THE ALLIES' SECRET WEAPON

SUMMARY:

The Ritchie Boys, trained in counter-intelligence at Maryland's Camp Ritchie, were essential to Allied victory in World War II. Many were European immigrants or the children of those immigrants; nearly fifteen percent were Jewish; and their fluency in German, French, Italian, Polish, and other European languages as well as their knowledge of local customs and culture was crucial to the war effort, especially after D-Day. They interrogated prisoners of war, acquiring valuable information that contributed to the war effort, and were embedded in Allied combat units, bridging the language barriers that faced British and American soldiers. My Presentation will shine a light on these secret Allied weapons and their contributions to victory in World War II.

ABOUT THE SPEAKER:

Linda De Roche is Professor of English and American Studies at Wesley College in Dover, DE, where she teaches courses in American literature and culture and gender studies. COLLISION ON ROUTE 40: COLD WAR TENSIONS & CIVIL RIGHTS

This presentation explores how Route 40 in Delaware and Maryland became an unexpected battleground for Cold War tensions and civil rights. On this corridor between Baltimore and the Delaware Memorial Bridge, international diplomacy, African decolonization, Jim Crow, Soviet propagandists, and Freedom Riders collided, forcing a confrontation for the Kennedy administration that involved global tensions and domestic policy.

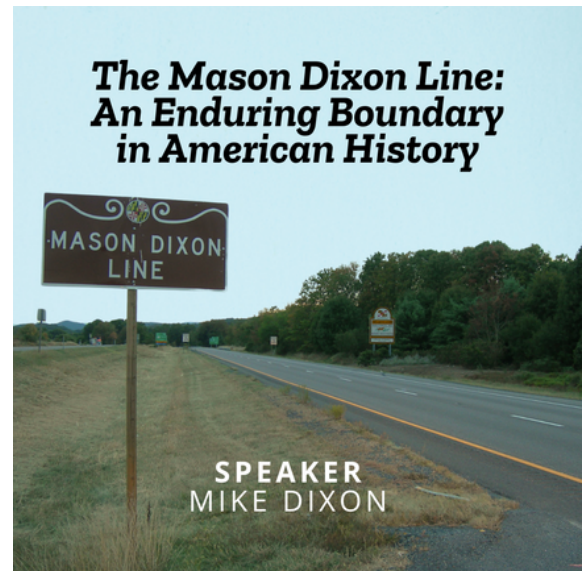

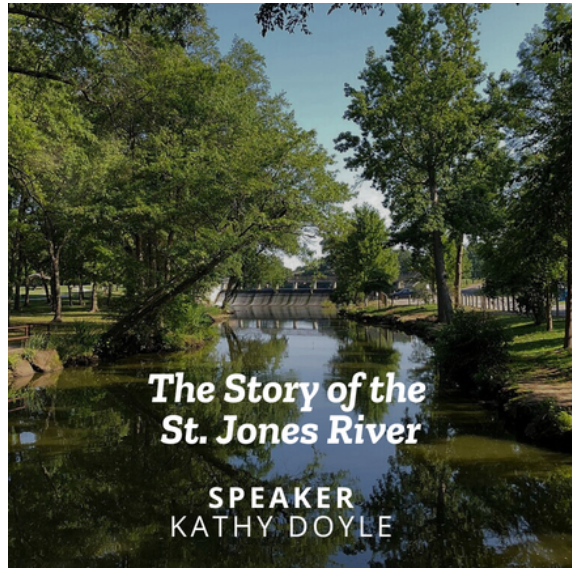


THE STORY OF THE ST. JONES RIVER

We begin our story with the earliest settlers, the Lenape and Nanticoke, and then travel through time up to today's citizens of Dover to learn how the river was used throughout history, what kind of shape it is in today, and what we need to do to make it fishable, potable, and swimmable once again.

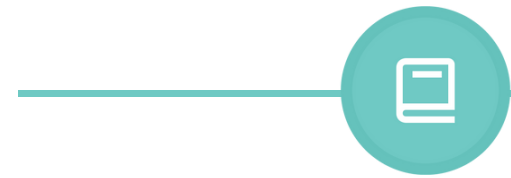

Mary Ann Shadd Cary was born to free blacks in Wilmington in 1823. At a time when women's talents were confined to the home, Mary Ann became a teacher, writer, staunch abolitionist, suffragist, the first black woman to publish a newspaper in North America, the first female admitted to Howard Law School and one of our country's first female lawyers. On the 200th anniversary of her birth, learn about her amazing life, her Delaware ancestors (dating before the Revolutionary War) and see how Delaware is finally recognizing the importance of this "diamond" of the "Diamond State."

ABOUT THE SPEAKER:

Lora Englehart has always been interested in American History, and in recent years has become fascinated by the wealth of little known *herstory* in our country. A simple article about freedom in the July 4, 1996 edition of the News Journal launched Englehart on a journey of discovery into the life of Wilmington-born Mary Ann Shadd Cary. Along the way, Englehart has learned about other incredible women and men who have made important contributions to our society, but were not included in history books because of their gender or race. It is an honor to share a piece of our story with you.

ABOUT THE SPEAKER:

Carla Guerrón Montero is a cultural and applied anthropologist trained in the United States and Latin America, and specialized in the anthropology of tourism, the anthropology of food, and the African diaspora. Professor Guerrón Montero is Professor of Anthropology at the University of Delaware, with joint appointments in Latin American and Iberian Studies, Africana Studies and Women and Gender Studies. She received a PhD degree in Cultural Anthropology and Latin American Studies from the University of Oregon; a Master of Arts degree in Applied Anthropology from Oregon State University (United States), and a Licenciatura degree in Socio-cultural Anthropology from the Pontificia Universidad Católica del Ecuador (Quito-Ecuador).

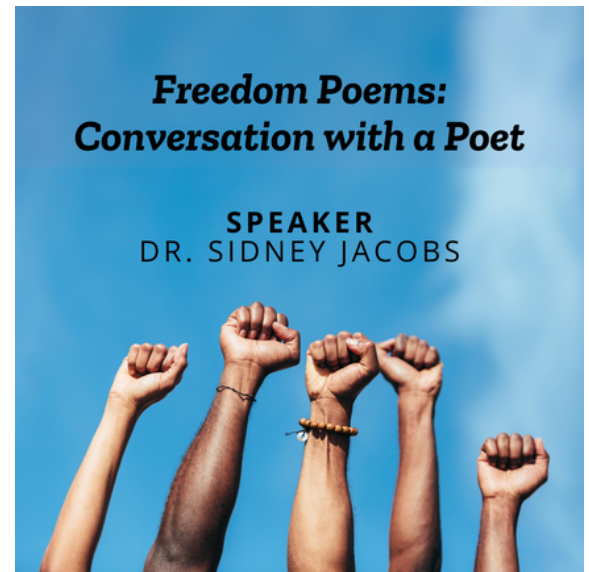

ABOUT THE SPEAKER:

Sid R. Jacobs, Ph.D., is a veteran, sociologist, poet, and former college professor. He was raised in Wade, North Carolina by his loving Grandmother, "Ma," "Mother Berl" and "Other Mothers." He attended Fayetteville State University before enlisting in the US Air Force, serving at Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota. At the apex of his 13-year military career, he was a narcotics detector dog handler and a member of the elite Tactical Neutralization Team (TNT). He furthered his education at the University of Delaware where he earned a bachelor's degree in history (and a minor in Black American Studies), as well as a master's degree and doctorate in sociology. His areas of expertise include: race, class, gender, reentry, and deviance. More, he uses poetry to deliver his "sociology." Dr. Jacobs recently published his first book entitled Freedom Poems: Poems to Live, Love, Fight, Die, and Resurrect By (Balboa Press).



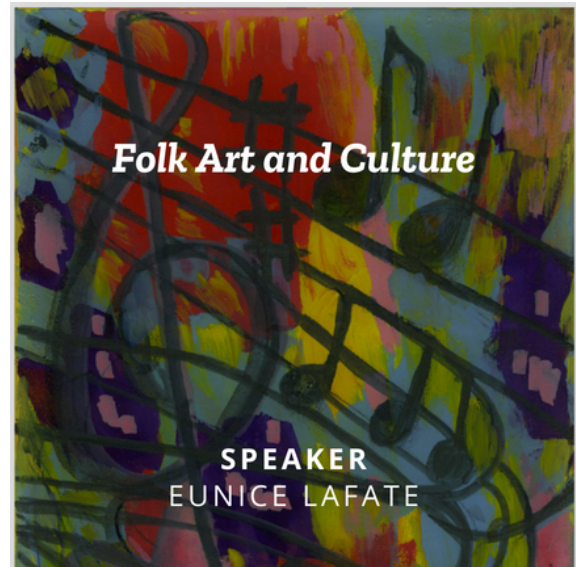


**SPEAKER:

Folk art is the art produced by self-taught people. Every culture has its share of folk artists, yet art historians often deny folk art its rightful place alongside fine art. As an educator, artist, former banker, human services administrator, writer, story-teller, and public speaker on Folk Art and Culture, Eunice LaFate has impacted the lives of countless people by sharing her talents, her art, and her respect for diversity.

Born in Jamaica, LaFate is a self-taught artist whose early works were influenced by the landscape, tones and culture of her island heritage. In transitioning to life in her new environment, LaFate's work has evolved to include themes of human diversity and cultural heritage.



THE REAL WOMEN:

VETERANS OF VIETNAM

SUMMARY:

Inspired by Kristin Hannah's best seller, *The Women*, a fictional account of Army nurse Frankie McGrath's experiences in war-torn Vietnam, journalist Nancy E. Lynch reads and discusses actual correspondence she received from REAL Delaware women in Vietnam.

Delaware military nurses wrote to Ms. Lynch's award-winning newspaper column, Nancy's Vietnam Mailbag, a popular read from 1968 to 1972 in *The Morning News*, then a statewide paper. And a special civilian "Donut Dolly" visited her newspaper office in 1970 to share her experiences.

Ms. Lynch included these women's letters, among the nearly 900 she received from Delaware troops in Vietnam, in her acclaimed book, *Vietnam Mailbag, Voices From the War: 1968-1972*. She has since gifted these war letters to Delaware Public Archives for their preservation.

ABOUT THE SPEAKER:

Journalist Nancy E. Lynch is the author of the award-winning social history, *Vietnam Mailbag, Voices From the War: 1968-1972*.
