Texting, social media, TikTok, and ChatGPT have become a part of our everyday existence. Email and Teams or Zoom meetings have inundated our workplace. A call for and a resistance to a return to the office and the classroom have divided us. But with the increase and convenience of technology, we have an epidemic of loneliness in this country, especially among those under the age of fifty, without significant differences between race and gender. We have greater access to information but not to each other. Our technological advances make connecting easier, but we make fewer connections and greater divisions. We have all witnessed, and perhaps have been guilty of, colleagues/friends/family sharing a meal in silence with heads buried in phones. Instead of texting, tweeting, and reposting at each other, to make human connections, this involves vulnerable conversations with human beings—allowing an openness to receive and give. The Humanities may seem at odds with technology because it values and centers a human experience at the core of its definition. Ultimately, we are humans seeking validation, understanding, and connection—we seek community. Delaware Humanities is committed to doing the messy but rewarding work of authentic conversations that produce human connections and community across the First State. We hope our work leads the way and serves as a model for our nation.

In 2024 Delaware Humanities pursued its mission to “strengthen our communities” by connecting non-profit organizations to one another and the audiences they serve through conversations inspired by our grantmaking and program services. With robust funding from the National Endowment for the Humanities, complemented by smaller grants from the State of Delaware and Delaware foundations as well as individual donors, Delaware Humanities served multiple communities in all three counties. Our Prime Time Family Reading program brought children ages 6-10 together with their grown-ups to read children’s modern classics and discuss the “big ideas” they inspire. Our brand-new Community Conversations program united neighbors with a trained facilitator both in public spaces and virtually to discuss complex issues of our times, and our toolkits provided all the components and research for community organizations to host their own discussions. Speakers programs sparked the curiosity of learners of all ages, and a special exhibit commemorating the 70th anniversary of Brown v. Board of Education generated discussions about the contributing Delaware cases and the lasting effects of the seminal Supreme Court case. In addition, Delaware Humanities awarded over 30 grants totaling over \$225,000 to libraries, historical societies, universities, and cultural and community organizations for exhibits, film screenings, discussion sessions, oral histories, cultural celebrations, and voter information. We concluded our fiscal year with our first Connect & Converse event, designed to bring the people behind Delaware’s community organizations together to discuss the ideas and issues they face and collectively find solutions. I extend my gratitude to all who supported the work of Delaware Humanities this year through donations, partnerships, advocacy, and participation.





OUR IMPACT



In 2024, we held **182 PROGRAMS** and awarded **32 GRANTS**

In FY24, our programs **reached 70,220** people across Delaware at host sites such as libraries, senior centers, schools, historical societies, museums, and community organizations.

These programs included our original exhibit **Injustice & Integration: 70 Years of *Brown v. Board of Education*, Speakers presentations, Prime Time Family Reading, Community Conversations**, our **Podcast**, and more.

We were also able to fund **32 projects** through our Action/Innovation and Opportunity grants. **\$228,629 was distributed to over 30 organizations** throughout the state.

For the grant projects completed in FY24, **714,855 people participated in activities** including festivals, reading and discussion programs, conferences, exhibits, lectures, and documentaries.

United We Stand

Our FY24 programming was in part guided and funded by **United We Stand: Connecting Through Culture**, a NEH initiative created to support state and jurisdictional humanities councils for work that “support[s] local programming that fosters community resilience, educates the public on the history of domestic extremism and hate-based violence, promotes civic engagement and social cohesion, and deepens public understanding of community, state, and national history.”

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

SPEAKERS



Our Speakers Program invites local scholars and experts to give public talks and classroom presentations on history, culture, literature, ethics, the environment, and everything in between, enriching the lives of Delawareans by providing free opportunities for learning right in their own communities. In FY24, we held 137 total Speakers programs, serving 2,923 individuals, hosted by 58 different organizations.

EXHIBITS



We created an original exhibit, *Injustice & Integration: 70 Years of Brown v. Board of Education*, that marked the 70th anniversary of Brown v. Board of Education and highlighted the Delaware chapters of the Brown v. Board story and their continued impact on our students, our communities, and our state. This exhibit was visited by 57,042 people in Delaware at 50 host organizations.

PRIME TIME



In 2023, we became an affiliate partner of Prime Time Family Reading. In 2024, we continued growing this nationally successful reading and discussion program here in our state. We hosted two more programs, one at the New Castle Public Library and one a partnership between Imani Village housing and the Wilmington Public Library. One father who participated described Prime Time as “the best reading program” he had ever attended.

CHECK OUT OUR 2024 PODCAST

Our podcast *A More Just Delaware* highlighted pivotal moments and legislation related to hate, prejudice, and the fight for equal rights for all in Delaware from the 1950s to today. Listeners learned about Delaware’s history and current landscape through a series of interviews with Delaware representatives, legislators, tribal leaders, and educators. A total of 4,097 people tuned in to this podcast in 2024.



GRANT HIGHLIGHTS

Celebrating Indigenous Americans
in the Delaware Region

The **powwow**: a Native American celebration rooted in the artful expression of culture and tradition. Music, dance, song, arts and crafts—all these come together in commemoration of community. We're proud to have supported two powwows by state-recognized tribes in Delaware during FY24.



In Newark, the Iron Hill Museum and Science Center

held the **2024 Iron Hill Powwow**. The annual celebration focused on the lives of indigenous elders and their knowledge of their culture, community, and history. Special discussions included the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Relatives

movement and the role of boarding schools in the indoctrination/assimilation of indigenous youths.

In Milton, the Nanticoke Indian Association hosted the **46th Annual Nanticoke Indian Powwow**.



Native storytelling, dancing, and music were the focal points of the celebration. The day started with the Grand Entry and the Flag Song, followed by the Veterans' Honor Song, and traditional dances including jingle dances, grass dances, and fancy dances for men and women.

Iron Hill also hosted the **Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women (MMIW) Memorial Grove**, a travelling grove set up to represent the numbers of victims part of the Missing, Murdered Indigenous Women/People. Attendants at the MMIW Memorial Grove provided education and a safe place for mourning and contemplation.

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


