- Contact the Speaker directly to arrange a date, time, and location for your program. Most presentations are **60-75 minutes** long (45-60 minute lecture, followed by time for audience questions), so please allow enough time for the program and questions at the end.
- Create and log in to your free Foundant account.

- Submit the online Speaker Request Form at least **four weeks before your program date**.
 - Your application may be rejected if you've requested the same program twice in a six month time frame or if you have any outstanding paperwork or payments due to Delaware Humanities.
 - An organization may request 4 programs at the subsidized rate within a year.

After your application is approved, you will...

- Sign the **Presentation Agreement** agreeing to follow DH's rules.
- Submit payment via check to Delaware Humanities
 Tiered pricing for nonprofits based on your organization's budget
 - Free for K-12 school classrooms

- Promote and enjoy your program! You can request promotional materials from DH. With some exceptions, these programs must be free and open to the public.

THE ORPHAN TRAIN MOVEMENT

1854-1929

SUMMARY

Learn the history of this seventy-five year "social experiment"—now recognized as our country's first Foster Care System—which transported an estimated 250,000 homeless children from the streets of East Coast cities to farming communities of the Midwest in search of stable homes. This presentation includes the first person account of orphan train rider Oliver Nordmark who, in 1906, traveled with his younger brother from the Children's Village on Long Island to the small town of Bern, Kansas. Attendees will hear audio recordings of Oliver telling just what it was like to ride the orphan train and then be chosen by a childless farmer and his wife. Additional recordings include "life in the orphanage" and "living in a sod house on the Kansas prairie." The presentation concludes with a discussion of the importance of journaling one's own story, through oral history or personal narrative, as a means of preserving social history. Q&A is encouraged throughout the presentation as well as at the end.


The History of Etiquette begins with the Middle Ages, and Erasmus's teaching of classroom etiquette to young men in the Catholic Church classrooms, then progresses to King Louis the XIV's use of the word etiquette, and how the social and etiquette expectations of polite society followed the early settlers of the United States. Audiences will learn how the demonstration of what is known as good manners were a part of survival techniques in the formation of our country! The program will also cover pandemic etiquette (from the Spanish Flu in 1918), to the more recent COVID-19 etiquette, and how that has changed human interaction. The program is very interactive, the audience gets to participate, there are props, and there can be costume changes!



SUMMARY

In 2016, a federal appeals court struck down an Ohio law that provided penalties for lying during political campaigns. The reason? There is, in fact, a constitutional right to lie. Sure, you can be prosecuted for things like fraud, perjury, and libel, but those are exceptions. In general, constitutional protection for free speech does not depend on whether the speech is true. And when the topic is politics, untruthful speech is not only protected under the First Amendment, but enjoys the highest level of constitutional protection. Why? For twenty minutes or so, we'll step back from the fray of partisan politics to take a look at the history and ideas behind our current system. Have we reached a point in the history of our country where political lying has so disrupted our electoral system that the public good requires the establishment of legal limits comparable to those placed on perjury? If so, what should such a policy look like, and what unintended consequences might follow?

SUMMARY

In 1941, an increasing number of Allied aircraft were being shot down in Nazi-occupied Europe. Although most downed airmen were killed or taken prisoner, some evaded capture and were sheltered by Allied sympathizers and the emerging resistance movement to German rule. The road of safety—and to fight again—for these airmen was a treacherous journey by train, by bicycle, and on foot that stretched hundreds of miles from Belgium, across occupied France, to the Pyrenees Mountains at the Spanish border. My presentation will focus primarily on the brave and selfless resistance women, especially the 24-year-old Belgian Andree de Jongh and the American Virginia d'Albert- Lake, who organized and conducted these journeys on this underground railroad, known as the Comet Line, who helped to save nearly 800 airmen.

THE RITCHIE BOYS THE ALLIES' SECRET WEAPON

The Ritchie Boys, trained in counter-intelligence at Maryland's Camp Ritchie, were essential to Allied victory in World War II. Many were European immigrants or the children of those immigrants; nearly fifteen percent were Jewish; and their fluency in German, French, Italian, Polish, and other European languages as well as their knowledge of local customs and culture was crucial to the war effort, especially after D-Day. They interrogated prisoners of war, acquiring valuable information that contributed to the war effort, and were embedded in Allied combat units, bridging the language barriers that faced British and American soldiers. My Presentation will shine a light on these secret Allied weapons and their contributions to victory in World War II.



"Harriet" reflects Dr. Jacobs's personal experience after viewing the movie Harriet and his numerous conflicting conversations about Harriet Tubman with members of his family. This poem explores the complexity of the modern Black experience, particularly themes of generational trauma, agency within slavery, and forgiveness.

"Where's the Unum?" explores Dr. Jacobs's experiences as a veteran alongside the current cultural and political divides in the United States. Dr. Jacobs straddles the double consciousness of what it means to be an American, a Black American, and a veteran, tackling the idea of loving a country so much that one feels obligated to scrutinize it.

Sidney R Jacobs, Ph.D., is an Air Force Veteran, sociologist, poet, and former college professor. His areas of expertise include: race, class, gender, reentry, and deviance. Inspired by Kristin Hannah's best seller, *The Women*, a fictional account of Army nurse Frankie McGrath's experiences in war-torn Vietnam, journalist Nancy E. Lynch reads and discusses actual correspondence she received from REAL Delaware women in Vietnam.

Delaware military nurses wrote to Ms. Lynch's award-winning newspaper column, Nancy's Vietnam Mailbag, a popular read from 1968 to 1972 in *The Morning News*, then a statewide paper. And a special civilian "Donut Dolly" visited her newspaper office in 1970 to share her experiences.

Ms. Lynch included these women's letters, among the nearly 900 she received from Delaware troops in Vietnam, in her acclaimed book, *Vietnam Mailbag, Voices From the War: 1968-1972.* She has since gifted these war letters to Delaware Public Archives for their preservation.

ABOUT THE SPEAKER

Journalist Nancy E. Lynch is the author of the award-winning social history, *Vietnam Mailbag, Voices from the War: 1968-1972* in which she collected nearly 1,000 letters and photos from Delaware troops on the front lines during the Vietnam War.



Ms. Lynch discusses and reads selected war letters from her book, Vietnam Mailbag, Voices From the War: 1968-1972, based on her popular newspaper column, "Nancy's Vietnam Mailbag." She is accompanied by Vietnam veteran Rick Lovekin, a Huey helicopter door gunner, Cobra crew chief, and frequent letter writer to Nancy, who shows slides from Vietnam set to 1960s music.



SUMMARY

When Delaware's 3 signers of the Declaration of Independence stepped up to sign over "our Lives, our Fortunes, and our sacred Honor" on the document, 2 of them were enslavers. However, by 1787, when it was time to sign the new U.S. Constitution, only one of Delaware's 5 signers was an enslaver. So, what happened? This presentation broadens our understanding of Delaware during the American Revolutionary period by telling the complicated relationship between Delaware's signers and enslavement and the impact of that relationship on Delaware's struggling abolitionist movement.

The line dividing life from death was not clearly defined in the 1800's. 

Cemeteries honor the dead and reflect our values and shared history. This program focuses on the restoration projects of two historic, forgotten Delaware cemeteries—on Delaware Health and Social Services' Herman Holloway Campus in New Castle—and how those projects offer a reflection of social and environmental values. Who is buried at these sites, and why? How did these cemeteries become forgotten? By restoring these cemeteries, we can encourage healing from years of disrespect shown to those buried there, paved over by the interstate. Restoration can also remedy some of the massive ecological damage caused by diverting the Christina River and destroying its surrounding wetland during the construction of I-95.


